

JAPN 1101- Elementary Japanese I

Course Description

In this course, we will learn Japanese focusing on how to use (= listen, speak, read and write) Japanese in real-life situations. Lectures will be mainly devoted to training in Japanese grammar, including practice problems and class activities among students. Students are required to memorize Japanese words, grammatical expressions, and Kanji on an everyday basis.

Course Objectives

Increasing communicative abilities in Japanese with a stronger emphasis on vocabulary and grammar. We will use examples from contemporary Japanese media, politics, and culture.

Course Materials

- Textbook: We will use *Genki 1: An Integrated Course in Elementary Japanese 1. 3rd edition*, by the Japan Times. You don't need the workbook.
- Materials given in each class (e.g., handouts).
- This website offers a variety of online materials to support your learning.

Course Structure

Homework

- Homework will be uploaded on Husky CT for every class.

- Each homework is due next class. You are encouraged to refer to the given materials while working on your assignments, and contact the instructor for any question.
- Submit your homework via Husky CT in PDF format. (**DO NOT submit a photo-format file (e.g., .jpeg, HEIC)**)
- Instructions for each homework assignment will be provided to you in a pdf format. You are expected to submit them with your **hand-written** answers by either (i) using an electronic pen (Apple Pencil, etc.), or by (ii) printing the pdf, writing your answers on it, and then use methods such as Adobe Scan to obtain a pdf version to submit.

QUIZZES

- All quizzes will be administrated on HuskyCT.
- A quiz will be uploaded on HuskyCT after each class. It will be due before the next class.
- Quizzes can be taken multiple times. You are encouraged to try until you get 100%.

Hiragana/Katakana Quiz

- Both quizzes will be on HuskyCT.
- The deadline for them is January 9th.

MID TERM /FINAL EXAM

- Students must take both the mid-term and final exam. They will be online.
- The final will not be cumulative.

ORAL EXAMS

- Students must take the mid-term and Final oral exam.
- Each exam will be online on Webex and about 5 to 10 minutes long.
- Instructions will be given in the class.

Tips

- **Speak Up!:** This is an intensive course. You will complete a semester worth of work within three weeks. **You are strongly encouraged to speak up if you have questions or need clarifications!** Let's make sure you are catching up with the content.
- **Kanji:** Do not use simplified forms. They are not used (and will not be understood) by Japanese speakers. In written exams, you will be more than welcome to use as many kanjis as you want, but you must **always** provide their pronunciation in hiragana.
- **Daily Office Hour:** I will aim at finishing every class at noon to have the remaining one hour for your questions or working on homework.
